Vale Professor Helen Farley – 28 June 1968 to 9 July 2025

It is with great sadness that we announce to the ASCILITE community the passing of **Professor Helen Farley**. Helen was known to many far and wide and crossed many people's paths and hearts. Helen was an active member of ASCILITE, joining in early 2005, being voted onto the ASCILITE Executive in 2015, becoming Vice President in 2017 and retiring from the ASCILITE Executive to take up a role in Christchurch, New Zealand, and returning to ASCILITE in 2023, when she had became a Professor and Director of Criminal Justice at the University of Canterbury.

During her time as an ASCILITE member she received an ASCILITE Innovation and Excellence Award in 2013 and was an ASCILITE Innovation Award winner in 2015. Helen said the following about herself: "As an educator, I am also a researcher of higher education, technology-enhanced learning, blended learning and the innovative use of technologies for learning,



especially virtual reality and augmented reality." Her research interests include digital equity, prisoner education, mobile learning, learning in virtual worlds and the educational application of virtual and augmented reality.

Professionally, Helen's LinkedIn profile gives a sense of the amazing, diverse, inclusive and intelligent academic that Helen was. She started out with a degree as a veterinarian ©, worked in a diverse range of industries, and completed five postgraduate degrees including her PhD. Her bio states:



Professor Helen Farley is the Director of Criminal Justice at the University of Canterbury in Ōtautahi Christchurch. She oversees the direction of the criminal justice programmes at the university and works closely with criminal justice agencies and NGOs. Prior to this, Helen worked for Ara Poutama Aotearoa Department of Corrections, overseeing prison education in the Southern Region and advising on the implementation of technology in the Department. Helen was the Acting Director of the Digital Life Lab at the University of Southern Queensland in Australia. She led a number of projects introducing digital technologies into prisons to provide access to digital higher education. The latest of these, the Australian government-funded \$AUD4.4 million

Making the Connection, saw 1700 course enrolments over 4 years. Helen is also the President of the Australasian Corrections Education Association (ACEA). She is the first woman, academic, and person outside of Australia to hold this role. She has steered the organisation towards an active and advisory role for Australasian corrections jurisdictions. Helen's own research is around higher education, neurodiversity, and technology in the carceral space. She also publishes on the mental health of criminal justice students and frontline criminal justice workers. She is widely published and appears at a number of international conferences. She is on the Expert Working Group on Technologies for Prisoner Rehabilitation for the United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute (UNICRI).

Sadly, we were recently informed by Helen Farley's partner, James, of her passing. James wrote on Helen's Facebook page:

This post is to let all those who loved Helen know that she suddenly and unexpectedly passed away on Wednesday night. She had been admitted to Christchurch Hospital earlier in the day and later took a sudden turn for the worst and was unable to be revived. She hadn't been in any pain and was active and positive to the end. Helen touched many people's lives and treasured your company and friendship. I know you will all mourn her loss and share in my grief.

Helen was great at sharing, on Facebook, her journeys through daily posts. They began with cat bombing photos, then views out of her accommodation window whilst away working, walks with street art and more recently, we were blessed by sunrise photos of the view Helen had from her home in Christchurch. She was truly blessed with a beautiful view every day.

A response to James's post, on behalf of ASCILITE community (and the Australian and New Zealand Virtual Worlds Working Group [VWWG] – which was formed out of ASCILITE – equivalent to a SIG) where dozens of us met through ASCILITE was posted as followings:

Hi James - we have never met but have to say, I was totally gutted by your message. I knew Helen such a long time before I actually met her in person. Helen and I used to "hang out" in the virtual world, discussing ways in which we could enhance our students' learnings.

I loved taking students to Helen's virtual religious precincts, where, with the click of a button, the church, synagogue, temple, or wherever we were, AND Helen's avatar, would change, depending on the type of religion that was being depicted at the time (holodecks - scene changers).

Then, we met in RL (real life) through ASCILITE, I have no idea when, but probably in 2009 - wrote papers together, presented together (I think one year Helen and I presented about 5 papers

together - mostly for others who could it make it to the conference), and eventually we were on the ASCILITE Executive together $\stackrel{\hookleftarrow}{\Longrightarrow}$.

Helen then took on the amazing opportunity and challenge, moving out of academia and to a new country (New Zealand). She was such an inspiring person to take on the opportunities that New Zealand had to offer her - leaving behind her beloved life in Australia and in particular, Brisbane. Helen had such a high social conscience, was an amazing colleague and friend, and she will be missed by so many ...
