membership and services

The NZ membership count grew significantly last year and every effort will be made to sustain their involvement in the society. In November 2003 our membership reached 480, with new membership accounting for 73 of these.

finances

Last year's conference in Auckland, New Zealand returned a very healthy profit of \$60,000 to the Society. For the financial year 2002 to 2003, the Society had an operating surplus of about \$45,000. The Society also has accumulated funds of over \$95,000. Our major expenses were running the Secretariat and production of AJET. A complete set of audited accounts will be presented and available at the Annual General Meeting in Adelaide, and later from the Secretariat in Wollongong.

community mentoring program

In May this year we announced the Community Mentoring Program. Five pairs of mentor/mentees were set up, each with a facilitator from the ascilite executive. The initial results of the program will be discussed at the conference in Adelaide.

ascilite fellow

Allan Christie has been a member of ascilite since 1987 and has been involved with the Executive since 1992. He helped establish the electronic information services of the society, has co-convened a conference, has edited and distributed newsletters for the society to name some of his contributions. His sustained and considerable support of the Society is unquestionably one of the reasons for its continued success.

conferences

The Society is grateful to the 2002 conference committee for their organisation of the conference at UNITEC, Auckland, New Zealand. The 2003 Annual Conference in Adelaide is shaping up to be a success and the 2004 Annual Conference in Perth is already well on the way with planning. Approximately 200 delegates have registered for ascilite 2003 in Adelaide. The theme for the conference is *interact: integrate: impact*. This year's conference has 59 full and 38 concise papers, all of which have been double-blind refereed. There are also 11 poster presentations and 7 workshops.
